

U.J. AWARD CEREMONY

In a special "Victory" award presentation ceremony last night, Col. Francis X. Purcell, Jr., Commanding Officer, 1301st Engineer Regiment, presented one Boldier's Medal, sixteen Bronze Star Medals and three Purple Hoarts to members of this Regiment.

The awards had been granted by General George S. Patton, Jr., Commanding General, Third United States Army, just before this unitshad left the St. Victor-

et Staging Area.

The prosentation speech by Col. Purcell follows:

"In the hour of victory, as in less happy hours in the past, it is my proudest privilege to salute the men that have made the 1301st Engineers the finest regiment in the army, and particularly chose whose outstanding performance has merited individual recognition."

"Some of these awards have been long in coming. Many more deserved, but it is impossible to place the credit where it is due. Then I think of the bold tactics of our companies during the race across Normandy, the bitter work in the rain and mud around Verdun, the mine fields and artillery fire of the Moselle and the Saar, and the grueling day and right effort on the Rhine, the Main and the Danube, I feel that everyone in the regiment has earned a dozen medals. fer that we are issuing today, together with those already issued, represent the ppreciation of the government and people f the United States for the exceptional work of these men and, by reflected clory, for us who fought and worked with

There are many events in hour history that we can speak of with just pride, whether we find ourselves among combat infartrymen or the courageous men of our hery, or the brave fliers of our Air Force. The engineers needn't take off their hats to anyone:"

when the army engineer assigned us a succer forty miles long for road maintenance on the main supply route. I asked ham "Tho is in front of us?" and he said the 1101st Engineers. I asked, "Who is an our right?" and he said the 1306th

Engineers. I asked him who is on our left?" and he said, "Five German Panzer divisions!" "A" Company sent out a few scouts to keep the German Panzers under control, and went ahead with their work. "B" Company was not quite so close, so they just ignored the Germans. "C" Company, in addition to their other duties, took over a German amounition and "."

"Then there was the job that Company did, back near Avranches, hen the German spearhead threatened to pinch off the whole Third Army and the suftwaffe was raining down bombs on the narrow neck of land that remained to us. But the bridge had to be built, and they built it".

"There was "D" Company's bridge over the Marne at Joinville, when they fought rising water might water below to keep the

only supply route !.

"There was "F" (on 's heroic stand at Pont-a-Mousson, when the whole right wing of the Third only depended upon their holding the bridge and the dyke. For a solid week the fight went on, and there was no saying who would win. But when the river subsided, not one hour had been lost because of the flood!.

"On all of these jobs, the equipment operators and drivers and surveyors of Headquarters Company worked with the lin companies, and the administrative men kept their records by candle light".

"Now it is all over. These are the happiost days that the world has meen in six dreary, dismal years. But we have made for our children, country and the world".
