

Decatur Engineer Turns Infantryman

Boldly an important sector on the Anzio beachhead in Italy, is a Fifth Army unit of combat engineers turned infantrymen. Since moving up into the lines, they have withstood three all-out attempts by the Germans to break through that sector, and have inflicted severe casualties on the attacking forces in each engagement.

Typical of all the companies of this unit is Company A which has come in with the assault teams in the invasions of North Africa, Sicily, Salerno, and Anzio. A member of the company who has been with it through every campaign is Private First Class Cecil Addy, son of Mrs. Ervin Addy of Decatur, Miss.

For almost three weeks after the Allied Fifth Army assault landings on this beachhead, before he was converted into an infantryman, the Mississippiian was operating with his company under heavy enemy shell fire and air attacks in the repair and maintenance of important roads, construction of bridges and in the laying and neutraliz-

ing of mine fields. They also rebuilt harbor installations, cleared the port of over 40 tons of demolitions, and built emergency ammunition and fuel dumps.

Serve With French

In the Fifth Army drive from Salerno to the gates of Cassino, the company has functioned as an infantry force with famed infantry divisions, and for several weeks was actively associated with the French troops. For the most part, however, the entire unit performed as combat engineers.

Now defending a sector that is virtually all marshland, the Decatur soldier claims that his foxhole assignments has as much as two and three feet of water in it. In addition to his Garand rifle, he has been manning machine guns and mortars and

Omit Jury Trials
