"The burst of an 82-mm shell cleared out my post. Two of my buddies were killed and five of us were wounded. We were up front near St. Lé and really giving it to the Germans with our fire when, I guess, one of their guns 'turned' on us. Four hours later they had me in a field hospital, and they cleaned up my arm. Army nurses were everywhere. The one that took care of me was grand. She did everything for me. She

gave me my penicillin treatment, but best of all, she gave me courage and made long, painful hours go by faster with her quick smile and cheerful manner. You know that field hospital was quite close to the lines and sometimes, roar of the guns made me a little nervous, and I needed someone to help me control myself. Well, the Army nurses did a great job for me and I saw them plenty. They were never too busy to help.

"SHE STOOD BY ME FOR HOURS"

"I dropped on France at H Hour minus Five. That's five hours before the troops hit the beaches on D Day. On the plane going over they gave us mimeographed sheets telling us, 'the eyes of the world are on you.' But mostly we were wondering how many German eyes were on us as we came in over 'Coronation' at 700 feet. As we stood up to jump, the tracer started coming through the sides of the plane and through the

windows. There was heavy mortar and machine-gun fire and sniping. I got mine nine days later, shooting a machine-gunner. A sniper put bullets through both my legs. I was carried first to an evacuation hospital, then to a station hospital in England. A nurse gave me my first bath in two weeks and watched over me like I was a baby. She stood by me for twelve hours and it will be a long time before I forget her."

"SHE SURE WAS A WELCOME SIGHT . . ."



PATRIOTIC FIRST CLASS SERVING SPLENDIDLY AT BURMA, ONE OF MURKIN'S HEROINES

"I was a senior air intelligence representative with Murkin's Marauders. For twelve days the Japs kept us trapped in the jungles of Burma. They had a regiment and we were fighting them with a battalion. It was on the ninth day that I got hit. I was in my fox hole and we were holding back a charge. A Jap machine gunner blasted me from close up. Three bullets went right through my helmet on the left side, but the steel

deflected the bullet and they just crossed my skull. I was knocked down and I lost my speech temporarily, but I got up again mighty quick and finished off that Jap. Three days later another battalion came up and freed us. They flew me out of Burma. The nurse on that plane - she sure was a welcome sight. I will get terrific headaches, but there's always an Army nurse to give me the 'tippy' that make them better."

"SHE WAS WONDERFUL . . ."

"The gong and I were stringing a main telephone line from Rome to Naples, working on the section near Spoleto, Italy, just behind Cassino when a German 30-mm. shell hit thirty feet from the pole I was working on. The explosion threw me fifteen or twenty feet from the pole. Believe me, that shell hung me for a while. Shell fragments ripped through my left arm, and the bullet broke my elbow in three places. Medical corpsmen

helped me to a nearby evacuation hospital and turned me over to an Army nurse for treatment. She was wonderful and within fifteen minutes had me all cleaned up and ready for my operation. Afterward she gave me blood plasma and watched over me during the time I was suffering from the after-effects of the wound. From then on I saw lots of Army nurses, and it wasn't a case of just one or two being wonderful, but all of them."
